DIFFERENCE BETWEEN PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT AND COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT:

WHAT IS PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT?

PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT REFERS TO A TYPE OF INTERACTION WHERE A CHILD IS PRESENT WITH A CAREGIVER OR ANOTHER INDIVIDUAL BUT DOES NOT ACTIVELY PARTICIPATE OR SHARE MUTUAL FOCUS. - **SHARED ATTENTION TO AN OBJECT OR EVENT:** THE CHILD AND CAREGIVER ARE BOTH OBSERVING OR INVOLVED WITH THE SAME OBJECT, BUT WITHOUT ACTIVE COMMUNICATION OR RECIPROCAL INTERACTION.
- **LIMITED SOCIAL INTERACTION:** THE CHILD DOES NOT INITIATE OR RESPOND TO SOCIAL CUES; THEIR ENGAGEMENT IS MORE OBSERVATIONAL.
- **MINIMAL VERBAL OR NONVERBAL COMMUNICATION:** THERE IS OFTEN LITTLE TO NO VERBAL EXCHANGE OR GESTURES DIRECTED TOWARDS THE CAREGIVER.
- **PASSIVE PARTICIPATION:** THE CHILD'S ROLE IS MORE OF AN OBSERVER RATHER THAN AN ACTIVE PARTICIPANT.

EXAMPLES OF PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT

1. A CHILD SITTING QUIETLY NEXT TO A PARENT WHO IS READING A BOOK, BOTH FOCUSED ON THE PAGES.
2. WATCHING A PUPPET SHOW TOGETHER WITHOUT INTERACTING WITH THE PUPPETS OR THE PERFORMER.
3. LOOKING AT PICTURES IN A PICTURE BOOK WHILE THE CAREGIVER POINTS OUT DETAILS BUT THE CHILD REMAINS QUIETLY ATTENTIVE.

DEVELOPMENTAL SIGNIFICANCE OF PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT

PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT OFTEN APPEARS IN EARLY DEVELOPMENTAL STAGES, ESPECIALLY DURING INFANCY. IT PROVIDES A FOUNDATION FOR LATER, MORE INTERACTIVE FORMS OF ENGAGEMENT BY:

- ALLOWING CHILDREN TO BECOME FAMILIAR WITH SHARED ATTENTION AND ENVIRONMENTAL STIMULI.
- FACILITATING THE RECOGNITION OF SOCIAL CUES AND OBJECTS OF INTEREST.
- SERVING AS A STEPPING STONE TOWARDS MORE ACTIVE SOCIAL INTERACTIONS.

WHAT IS COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT?

COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT IS A MORE ADVANCED AND INTERACTIVE FORM OF SHARED ATTENTION WHERE BOTH THE CHILD AND CAREGIVER ACTIVELY PARTICIPATE IN A MUTUAL, GOAL-DIRECTED INTERACTION. THIS TYPE OF ENGAGEMENT INVOLVES RECIPROCAL COMMUNICATION, SHARED FOCUS, AND COLLABORATIVE INVOLVEMENT.

CHARACTERISTICS OF COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT

- **MUTUAL FOCUS AND SHARED GOALS:** BOTH PARTICIPANTS ARE ACTIVELY ENGAGED IN THE SAME ACTIVITY WITH SHARED INTENTIONS.
- **RECIPROCAL COMMUNICATION:** INCLUDES VERBAL EXCHANGES, GESTURES, OR FACIAL EXPRESSIONS THAT RESPOND TO EACH OTHER.
- **ACTIVE PARTICIPATION:** THE CHILD INITIATES OR RESPONDS TO SOCIAL CUES, DEMONSTRATING AN UNDERSTANDING OF SHARED GOALS.
- **FLEXIBLE AND DYNAMIC:** THE INTERACTION ADAPTS IN REAL-TIME BASED ON THE RESPONSES OF BOTH PARTIES.

EXAMPLES OF COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT

1. A PARENT AND CHILD PLAYING WITH BUILDING BLOCKS, WORKING TOGETHER TO CONSTRUCT A TOWER, TAKING TURNS AND DISCUSSING THEIR PROGRESS.
2. DURING A STORYTIME, THE CHILD POINTS TO PICTURES AND ASKS QUESTIONS, WHILE THE CAREGIVER RESPONDS, FOSTERING DIALOGUE.
3. ENGAGING IN PRETEND PLAY WHERE BOTH PARTICIPANTS ASSUME ROLES AND COLLABORATE ON A SCENARIO, SUCH AS PLAYING "HOUSE" OR "DOCTOR."

DEVELOPMENTAL SIGNIFICANCE OF COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT

THIS FORM OF ENGAGEMENT IS CRUCIAL FOR COGNITIVE, LANGUAGE, AND SOCIAL DEVELOPMENT. IT SUPPORTS:

- THE DEVELOPMENT OF THEORY OF MIND AND UNDERSTANDING OTHERS' PERSPECTIVES.
- THE ENHANCEMENT OF LANGUAGE SKILLS THROUGH RECIPROCAL INTERACTIONS.
- PROBLEM-SOLVING ABILITIES FOSTERED BY COLLABORATIVE ACTIVITIES.

- ATTACHMENT SECURITY AND SOCIAL BONDING.

KEY DIFFERENCES BETWEEN PASSIVE AND COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT

UNDERSTANDING THE DISTINCTIONS BETWEEN THESE TWO TYPES OF ENGAGEMENT INVOLVES EXAMINING THEIR CORE FEATURES, DEVELOPMENTAL ROLES, AND IMPLICATIONS FOR INTERVENTION.

1. LEVEL OF ACTIVE PARTICIPATION

1. **PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** THE CHILD OBSERVES WITHOUT INITIATING OR RESPONDING ACTIVELY; INTERACTION IS LARGELY UNIDIRECTIONAL.
2. **COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** THE CHILD ACTIVELY PARTICIPATES, INITIATES, AND RESPONDS WITHIN A RECIPROCAL, SHARED ACTIVITY.

2. NATURE OF SOCIAL INTERACTION

1. **PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** MINIMAL OR NO SOCIAL CUES EXCHANGED; FOCUS IS PRIMARILY ON SHARED ATTENTION TO AN OBJECT OR EVENT.
2. **COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** RICH SOCIAL EXCHANGES, INCLUDING VERBAL AND NONVERBAL CUES, MUTUAL RESPONSIVENESS, AND SHARED INTENTIONS.

3. DEVELOPMENTAL PROGRESSION

1. **PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** TYPICALLY OBSERVED IN EARLY INFANCY; SERVES AS A DEVELOPMENTAL PRECURSOR.
2. **COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** EMERGES LATER AS CHILDREN DEVELOP SOCIAL-COGNITIVE SKILLS AND LANGUAGE ABILITIES.

4. COGNITIVE AND LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT

1. **PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** SUPPORTS ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS BUT LESS DIRECTLY LINKED TO LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT.
2. **COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** STRONGLY ASSOCIATED WITH LANGUAGE ACQUISITION AND COGNITIVE SKILLS DUE TO ACTIVE DIALOGUE AND SHARED PROBLEM-SOLVING.

5. THERAPEUTIC AND EDUCATIONAL IMPLICATIONS

- **PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** USEFUL FOR ESTABLISHING ATTENTION AND FAMILIARITY WITH SHARED EXPERIENCES.
- **COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT:** CRITICAL FOR FOSTERING HIGHER-LEVEL SOCIAL SKILLS, LANGUAGE, AND COMPLEX COGNITIVE FUNCTIONS.

PRACTICAL STRATEGIES TO PROMOTE BOTH TYPES OF ENGAGEMENT

ENHANCING CHILDREN'S ENGAGEMENT LEVELS REQUIRES INTENTIONAL STRATEGIES TAILORED TO THEIR DEVELOPMENTAL STAGE AND INDIVIDUAL NEEDS. HERE ARE SOME PRACTICAL APPROACHES:

PROMOTING PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT

- PROVIDE CAPTIVATING, AGE-APPROPRIATE VISUAL STIMULI, SUCH AS COLORFUL BOOKS OR TOYS.
- CREATE A CALM ENVIRONMENT THAT ENCOURAGES CHILDREN TO OBSERVE AND PROCESS STIMULI AT THEIR OWN PACE.
- USE SIMPLE GESTURES AND FACIAL EXPRESSIONS TO DRAW ATTENTION WITHOUT DEMANDING ACTIVE PARTICIPATION.

FOSTERING COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT

- ENCOURAGE TURN-TAKING GAMES AND SHARED ACTIVITIES LIKE BUILDING BLOCKS OR PRETEND PLAY.
- USE OPEN-ENDED QUESTIONS TO PROMOTE DIALOGUE AND SHARED PROBLEM-SOLVING.
- MODEL SOCIAL BEHAVIORS, SUCH AS POINTING, GESTURING, AND VERBALIZING THOUGHTS, TO STIMULATE RECIPROCAL INTERACTIONS.
- RESPOND CONTINGENTLY TO CHILDREN'S CUES TO REINFORCE SHARED FOCUS AND MUTUAL UNDERSTANDING.

CONCLUSION

THE DISTINCTION BETWEEN PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT AND COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT IS FUNDAMENTAL IN UNDERSTANDING CHILDREN'S SOCIAL AND COGNITIVE DEVELOPMENT. RECOGNIZING THESE DIFFERENCES ENABLES CAREGIVERS, EDUCATORS, AND THERAPISTS TO DESIGN DEVELOPMENTALLY APPROPRIATE ACTIVITIES THAT SCAFFOLD CHILDREN'S ENGAGEMENT LEVELS, ULTIMATELY SUPPORTING THEIR OVERALL DEVELOPMENTAL TRAJECTORY.

BY FOSTERING BOTH PASSIVE AND COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT, WE CAN CREATE ENRICHING ENVIRONMENTS THAT PROMOTE SOCIAL BONDING, LANGUAGE DEVELOPMENT, AND COGNITIVE GROWTH, SETTING CHILDREN ON A PATH TOWARD SUCCESSFUL SOCIAL INTERACTIONS AND LIFELONG LEARNING.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

WHAT IS THE PRIMARY DIFFERENCE BETWEEN PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT AND COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT?

HOW DOES COMMUNICATION DIFFER BETWEEN PASSIVE AND COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENTS?

PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT OFTEN INVOLVES MINIMAL COMMUNICATION AS UNITS ACT INDEPENDENTLY, WHEREAS COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT REQUIRES CONTINUOUS AND DETAILED COMMUNICATION TO SYNCHRONIZE ACTIONS EFFECTIVELY.

WHAT ARE THE ADVANTAGES OF COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT OVER PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT?

CAN PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT ESCALATE INTO COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT?

YES, DEPENDING ON THE SITUATION, PASSIVE UNITS CAN ESCALATE THEIR EFFORTS AND TRANSITION INTO COORDINATED EFFORTS TO BETTER ADDRESS THREATS OR OBJECTIVES, ESPECIALLY WHEN INITIAL INDEPENDENT ACTIONS ARE INSUFFICIENT.

WHAT ARE THE TYPICAL CHALLENGES FACED IN IMPLEMENTING COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT?

CHALLENGES INCLUDE ENSURING EFFECTIVE COMMUNICATION, MAINTAINING SYNCHRONIZATION UNDER STRESS, MANAGING COMPLEX COMMAND STRUCTURES, AND OVERCOMING INTEROPERABILITY ISSUES AMONG DIFFERENT UNITS OR PLATFORMS.

WHICH TYPE OF ENGAGEMENT IS MORE SUITABLE FOR DYNAMIC AND RAPIDLY CHANGING COMBAT ENVIRONMENTS?

DEFINING PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT AND COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT

PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT (PJE)

PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT REFERS TO A CONDITION WHERE A JOINT OR A SET OF JOINTS IS INVOLVED IN MOVEMENT OR POSITIONING WITHOUT ACTIVE MUSCULAR EFFORT OR VOLUNTARY CONTROL FROM THE INDIVIDUAL. IN THIS STATE, EXTERNAL FORCES—SUCH AS GRAVITY, MANUAL ASSISTANCE, OR MECHANICAL DEVICES—DRIVE JOINT MOVEMENT. PJE IS PRIMARILY CHARACTERIZED BY THE ABSENCE OF ACTIVE MUSCLE ACTIVATION AIMED AT MOVEMENT GENERATION, WITH THE INDIVIDUAL TYPICALLY NOT EXERTING EFFORT TO INITIATE OR CONTROL THE MOVEMENT.

KEY FEATURES OF PJE:

- MOVEMENT IS FACILITATED OR INDUCED EXTERNALLY
- NO VOLUNTARY MUSCLE ACTIVATION INVOLVED
- OFTEN OBSERVED DURING EARLY DEVELOPMENTAL STAGES OR IN CLINICAL INTERVENTIONS
- USED IN PASSIVE STRETCHING, MOBILIZATION, OR ASSISTED MOVEMENT THERAPIES

EXAMPLES:

- A PHYSICAL THERAPIST MOVING A PATIENT'S LIMB PASSIVELY DURING THERAPY
- AN INFANT'S LIMB MOVEMENT RESULTING FROM EXTERNAL STIMULI RATHER THAN VOLUNTARY CONTROL
- USE OF MECHANICAL ORTHOSES TO POSITION JOINTS

COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT (CJE)

COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT INVOLVES ACTIVE, VOLUNTARY, AND GOAL-DIRECTED INTERACTIONS AMONG MULTIPLE JOINTS AND BODY SEGMENTS. IT REFLECTS A FUNCTIONAL SYNERGY WHERE JOINTS WORK TOGETHER HARMONIOUSLY TO PRODUCE SMOOTH, EFFICIENT, AND PURPOSEFUL MOVEMENTS. CJE IS CHARACTERIZED BY MOTOR PLANNING, SENSORIMOTOR INTEGRATION, AND THE RECRUITMENT OF MUSCULAR SYSTEMS TO ACHIEVE SPECIFIC MOVEMENT GOALS, SUCH AS REACHING, WALKING, OR MANIPULATING OBJECTS.

KEY FEATURES OF CJE:

- ACTIVE MUSCLE ENGAGEMENT AND VOLUNTARY CONTROL
- SYNCHRONIZATION AND TIMING AMONG MULTIPLE JOINTS
- GOAL-ORIENTED AND ADAPTABLE TO TASK DEMANDS
- UNDERLYING NEUROPHYSIOLOGICAL PROCESSES INVOLVE CORTICAL AND SUBCORTICAL PATHWAYS

EXAMPLES:

- REACHING FOR AN OBJECT WHILE MAINTAINING TRUNK STABILITY
- WALKING GAIT INVOLVING COORDINATED HIP, KNEE, AND ANKLE MOVEMENTS
- PLAYING A MUSICAL INSTRUMENT REQUIRING PRECISE JOINT COORDINATION

NEUROPHYSIOLOGICAL BASES AND MECHANISMS

NEUROPHYSIOLOGY OF PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT

PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT PRIMARILY INVOLVES SENSORY FEEDBACK MECHANISMS AND REFLEX PATHWAYS RATHER THAN CORTICAL MOTOR COMMANDS. WHEN EXTERNAL FORCES MOVE A JOINT, PROPRIOCEPTORS SUCH AS MUSCLE SPINDLES AND GOLGI TENDON ORGANS DETECT STRETCH AND TENSION, TRANSMITTING INFORMATION TO THE CENTRAL NERVOUS SYSTEM (CNS). THESE FEEDBACK SIGNALS ARE USED TO MODULATE REFLEX RESPONSES BUT DO NOT INVOLVE VOLUNTARY MOTOR PLANNING.

MECHANISMS INVOLVED INCLUDE:

- SPINAL REFLEX PATHWAYS
- SENSORY AFFERENT SIGNALING
- MINIMAL OR ABSENT MOTOR CORTICAL ACTIVATION

IN INDIVIDUALS WITH NEUROLOGICAL IMPAIRMENTS, PJE CAN BE USEFUL FOR MAINTAINING JOINT MOBILITY AND PREVENTING CONTRACTURES, AS IT DOES NOT REQUIRE VOLUNTARY EFFORT.

NEUROPHYSIOLOGY OF COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT

COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT ACTIVATES COMPLEX NETWORKS WITHIN THE CNS, INVOLVING THE MOTOR CORTEX, CEREBELLUM, BASAL GANGLIA, AND SENSORIMOTOR INTEGRATION PATHWAYS. VOLITIONAL MOVEMENT REQUIRES THE PLANNING, INITIATION, AND EXECUTION OF MOTOR COMMANDS, ALONG WITH CONTINUOUS FEEDBACK ADJUSTMENTS TO ENSURE SMOOTH AND ACCURATE MOVEMENTS.

KEY NEUROPHYSIOLOGICAL FEATURES INCLUDE:

- CORTICAL INVOLVEMENT FOR MOTOR PLANNING AND EXECUTION
- SENSORIMOTOR INTEGRATION FOR REAL-TIME ADJUSTMENTS
- CENTRAL PATTERN GENERATORS (CPGs) IN SPINAL CORD FOR RHYTHMIC ACTIVITIES LIKE WALKING
- PLASTICITY MECHANISMS SUPPORTING LEARNING AND ADAPTATION

THIS LEVEL OF ENGAGEMENT UNDERPINS COMPLEX MOTOR SKILLS AND ADAPTIVE CONTROL NECESSARY FOR FUNCTIONAL INDEPENDENCE.

DEVELOPMENTAL PERSPECTIVES AND CLINICAL IMPLICATIONS

DEVELOPMENTAL ASPECTS

IN INFANCY AND EARLY CHILDHOOD, PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT PREDOMINATES AS MOTOR SYSTEMS ARE IMMATURE. INFANTS INITIALLY DEPEND ON REFLEXES AND EXTERNAL STIMULI FOR MOVEMENT, GRADUALLY DEVELOPING ACTIVE CONTROL AS NEURAL PATHWAYS MATURE.

DEVELOPMENTAL PROGRESSION:

- NEWBORNS EXHIBIT PREDOMINANTLY PASSIVE MOVEMENTS
- EMERGENCE OF ACTIVE VOLUNTARY CONTROL AROUND 4-6 MONTHS
- TRANSITION TO COORDINATED MOVEMENT PATTERNS WITH NEURODEVELOPMENT

IN NEURODEVELOPMENTAL DISORDERS SUCH AS CEREBRAL PALSY, DEFICITS IN TRANSITIONING FROM PASSIVE TO ACTIVE AND

COORDINATED MOVEMENTS ARE COMMON, EMPHASIZING THE IMPORTANCE OF TARGETED INTERVENTIONS.

CLINICAL APPLICATIONS AND THERAPEUTIC STRATEGIES

UNDERSTANDING THE DISTINCTION ASSISTS CLINICIANS IN DESIGNING APPROPRIATE THERAPIES:

SUITABLE FOR	PATIENTS WITH SEVERE MOTOR IMPAIRMENTS, EARLY DEVELOPMENTAL STAGES	PATIENTS WITH RESIDUAL VOLUNTARY CONTROL, AIMING FOR FUNCTIONAL INDEPENDENCE

THERAPEUTIC IMPLICATIONS:

- PJE IS OFTEN USED IN EARLY REHAB PHASES OR WHEN VOLUNTARY CONTROL IS COMPROMISED.
- CJE IS ESSENTIAL FOR FUNCTIONAL RECOVERY, SKILL ACQUISITION, AND MOTOR LEARNING.

IMPACTS ON MOTOR LEARNING AND REHABILITATION OUTCOMES

EFFECTIVE REHABILITATION HINGES ON UNDERSTANDING HOW JOINTS ARE ENGAGED DURING THERAPY. BOTH FORMS OF ENGAGEMENT CONTRIBUTE UNIQUELY:

- PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT CAN HELP IN MAINTAINING JOINT HEALTH, REDUCING SPASTICITY, AND PROVIDING SENSORY INPUT THAT MAY FACILITATE NEURAL PLASTICITY.
- COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT PROMOTES MOTOR LEARNING, CORTICAL REORGANIZATION, AND FUNCTIONAL SKILL DEVELOPMENT.

RESEARCH SUGGESTS THAT COMBINING PASSIVE AND ACTIVE-ASSISTED MOVEMENTS WITH ACTIVE, GOAL-DIRECTED TASKS PRODUCES OPTIMAL OUTCOMES, LEVERAGING NEUROPLASTICITY AND MOTOR LEARNING PRINCIPLES.

SUMMARY OF KEY DIFFERENCES

TO ENCAPSULATE THE CORE DISTINCTIONS:

- ACTIVE VS. PASSIVE: CJE INVOLVES VOLUNTARY, MUSCULAR ACTIVATION; PJE RELIES ON EXTERNAL FORCES WITHOUT VOLUNTARY EFFORT.
- NEUROPHYSIOLOGICAL BASIS: PJE IS MEDIATED PRIMARILY THROUGH REFLEXES AND SENSORY FEEDBACK; CJE INVOLVES CORTICAL AND SUBCORTICAL MOTOR CONTROL PATHWAYS.
- DEVELOPMENTAL ROLE: PJE IS PREDOMINANT IN EARLY DEVELOPMENT; CJE EMERGES WITH MATURATION AND EXPERIENCE.
- THERAPEUTIC GOALS: PJE AIMS AT JOINT HEALTH AND SENSORY STIMULATION; CJE AIMS AT FUNCTIONAL MOVEMENT AND SKILL MASTERY.
- PATIENT INVOLVEMENT: CJE REQUIRES ACTIVE PARTICIPATION; PJE CAN BE ADMINISTERED PASSIVELY WITHOUT PATIENT EFFORT.

CONCLUSION

UNDERSTANDING THE DIFFERENCE BETWEEN PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT AND COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT IS CRUCIAL FOR TAILORING INTERVENTIONS THAT ALIGN WITH AN INDIVIDUAL'S NEUROPHYSIOLOGICAL STATUS, DEVELOPMENTAL STAGE, AND THERAPEUTIC GOALS. WHILE PASSIVE JOINT ENGAGEMENT PROVIDES FOUNDATIONAL SUPPORT FOR JOINT HEALTH AND SENSORY INPUT, COORDINATED JOINT ENGAGEMENT IS CENTRAL TO ACHIEVING FUNCTIONAL MOVEMENT AND INDEPENDENCE. A NUANCED APPRECIATION OF THESE STRATEGIES ENABLES CLINICIANS AND RESEARCHERS TO OPTIMIZE REHABILITATION PROTOCOLS, FACILITATE MOTOR LEARNING, AND ULTIMATELY IMPROVE OUTCOMES FOR INDIVIDUALS WITH MOTOR IMPAIRMENTS.

AS NEUROREHABILITATION CONTINUES TO EVOLVE, INTEGRATING INSIGHTS FROM MOTOR CONTROL THEORIES AND NEUROPHYSIOLOGY WILL ENHANCE OUR CAPACITY TO DESIGN INTERVENTIONS THAT EFFECTIVELY HARNESS BOTH PASSIVE AND ACTIVE MECHANISMS OF JOINT ENGAGEMENT. FUTURE RESEARCH EXPLORING THE INTERPLAY BETWEEN THESE FORMS OF ENGAGEMENT WILL FURTHER REFINE THERAPEUTIC APPROACHES AND DEEPEN OUR UNDERSTANDING OF HUMAN MOTOR DEVELOPMENT AND RECOVERY.

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
