

4. WHO WERE THE NEW IMMIGRANTS COMING TO THE US IN THE LATE 19TH CENTURY AND HOW WERE THEY DIFFERENT

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THE LATE 19TH CENTURY MARKED A PIVOTAL PERIOD IN AMERICAN HISTORY, CHARACTERIZED BY A MASSIVE WAVE OF IMMIGRATION THAT DRASTICALLY TRANSFORMED THE NATION'S DEMOGRAPHIC, CULTURAL, AND ECONOMIC LANDSCAPE. THIS INFUX OF NEWCOMERS LED TO THE GROWTH OF ETHNIC ENCLAVES IN AMERICAN CITIES, SIGNIFICANT SHIFTS IN LABOR MARKETS, AND SOCIAL TENSIONS. THE NEW WAVE OF IMMIGRANTS DIFFERED MARKEDLY FROM EARLIER SETTLERS, BOTH IN ORIGIN AND IN THEIR CULTURAL, LINGUISTIC, AND RELIGIOUS BACKGROUNDS.

ORIGINS OF THE NEW IMMIGRANTS

THE NEW IMMIGRANTS PRIMARILY HAILED FROM SOUTHERN AND EASTERN EUROPE, REGIONS THAT HAD PREVIOUSLY CONTRIBUTED RELATIVELY FEW SETTLERS TO THE UNITED STATES. THEIR COUNTRIES OF ORIGIN INCLUDED:

- ITALY
- GREECE
- POLAND
- RUSSIA
- AUSTRIA-HUNGARY (NOW PARTS OF AUSTRIA, HUNGARY, CZECH REPUBLIC, SLOVAKIA)
- SLAVIC REGIONS
- THE BALKANS (INCLUDING SERBIA AND BULGARIA)
- THE OTTOMAN EMPIRE (INCLUDING MANY JEWISH IMMIGRANTS FROM EASTERN EUROPE)

IN CONTRAST TO EARLIER WAVES, WHICH MOSTLY CAME FROM NORTHERN AND WESTERN EUROPE (SUCH AS ENGLAND, IRELAND, GERMANY, AND SCANDINAVIA), THESE NEW IMMIGRANTS BROUGHT DIFFERENT LANGUAGES, RELIGIONS, AND CUSTOMS.

HOW WERE THEY DIFFERENT FROM EARLIER IMMIGRANTS?

1. GEOGRAPHICAL ORIGINS
