- PRESENT PERFECT: **HAVE/HAS GONE** (E.G., "I HAVE GONE TO THE STORE.")
- PAST PERFECT: **HAD GONE** (E.G., "I HAD GONE TO THE STORE BEFORE IT CLOSED.")
- FUTURE PERFECT: **WILL HAVE GONE** (E.G., "I WILL HAVE GONE TO THE STORE BY THEN.")

PERFECT CONTINUOUS TENSES

- PRESENT PERFECT CONTINUOUS: **HAVE/HAS BEEN GOING**
- PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS: **HAD BEEN GOING**
- FUTURE PERFECT CONTINUOUS: **WILL HAVE BEEN GOING**

WHY IS IT IMPORTANT TO KNOW THE TENSE OF A VERB?

KNOWING THE TENSE OF A VERB LIKE *WENT* HELPS IN:

- CORRECTLY CONSTRUCTING SENTENCES.
- MAINTAINING CONSISTENCY IN STORYTELLING OR NARRATION.
- AVOIDING GRAMMATICAL ERRORS THAT CAN CONFUSE THE READER.
- CONVEYING THE CORRECT TIMEFRAME FOR ACTIONS.

COMMON MISTAKES IN IDENTIFYING TENSES
