OFTEN, THE MAIN CLAIM IS FOUND AT THE BEGINNING OR END OF AN INTRODUCTION, BUT IT CAN ALSO APPEAR THROUGHOUT THE TEXT. AN EFFECTIVE CLAIM IS OFTEN REITERATED OR SUPPORTED WITH EVIDENCE.

APPLYING CRITICAL THINKING TO THE SELECTION

STEP-BY-STEP APPROACH

1. READ THE ENTIRE SELECTION CAREFULLY TO UNDERSTAND THE OVERALL MESSAGE.

FINAL THOUGHTS

UNDERSTANDING WHICH SENTENCE FROM A SELECTION BEST STATES ITS CLAIM IS FUNDAMENTAL TO EFFECTIVE READING COMPREHENSION AND LITERARY ANALYSIS.
