MODERN RELEVANCE

TODAY, TWAIN'S INSIGHTS REMAIN RELEVANT AS REFLECTIONS ON SOCIAL STRATIFICATION, THE NATURE OF WORK, AND THE AMERICAN DREAM. HIS DEPICTION OF A YOUNG ENGINEER WITH MONEY UNDERSCORES THAT OPPORTUNITY AND WEALTH CAN ARISE IN UNEXPECTED PLACES, EVEN IN THE ROUGH-AND-TUMBLE WORLD OF THE MISSISSIPPI RIVER.

CONCLUSION
