UNDERSTANDING THE ROLE OF COMMAS IN WRITING

WHAT DO COMMAS DO?

THE CONSEQUENCES OF INCORRECT COMMA USAGE

INCORRECT OR MISSING COMMAS CAN:

- CHANGE THE MEANING OF A SENTENCE
- MAKE SENTENCES DIFFICULT TO UNDERSTAND
- CREATE AMBIGUITY
- LEAD TO GRAMMATICAL ERRORS THAT DIMINISH CREDIBILITY

FOR EXAMPLE:

- "LET'S EAT, GRANDMA." (INVITING GRANDMA TO EAT)
- "LET'S EAT GRANDMA." (SUGGESTING GRANDMA IS THE MEAL)

THIS EMPHASIZES THE IMPORTANCE OF CORRECT PUNCTUATION.

ANALYZING THE SENTENCE: "JOHN GLENN WINKED,"

THE BASIC SENTENCE STRUCTURE

THE SENTENCE "JOHN GLENN WINKED," APPEARS STRAIGHTFORWARD BUT ENDS WITH A COMMA, WHICH RAISES QUESTIONS ABOUT ITS GRAMMATICAL CORRECTNESS. COMMON INTERPRETATIONS INCLUDE:

WHEN IS A COMMA NEEDED AFTER A CLAUSE?

A COMMA AFTER "JOHN GLENN WINKED" CAN BE APPROPRIATE IF:

- THE SENTENCE CONTINUES WITH ADDITIONAL INFORMATION
- IT INTRODUCES A QUOTATION OR APPOSITIVE
- IT IS PART OF A LIST

FOR EXAMPLE:

CORRECTING THE SENTENCE

DEPENDING ON CONTEXT, THE SENTENCE COULD BE CORRECTED AS:

- "JOHN GLENN WINKED." (NO COMMA NEEDED IF COMPLETE)
- "JOHN GLENN WINKED, THEN HE SMILED." (COMMA BEFORE COORDINATING CONJUNCTION)
- "JOHN GLENN WINKED, A SMALL BUT MEANINGFUL GESTURE." (COMMA TO SET OFF AN APPOSITIVE)

THE KEY IS TO DETERMINE WHETHER THE COMMA SERVES A PURPOSE OR MERELY INTRODUCES A GRAMMATICAL ERROR.

GUIDELINES FOR PROPER USE OF COMMAS

WHEN TO USE COMMAS

USE COMMAS IN THE FOLLOWING SITUATIONS:

1. TO SEPARATE ITEMS IN A LIST:

EXAMPLE: "JOHN GLENN WINKED, SMILED, AND WAVED."

2. BEFORE COORDINATING CONJUNCTIONS IN COMPOUND SENTENCES:

EXAMPLE: "JOHN GLENN WINKED, AND THE CROWD CHEERED."

3. TO SET OFF INTRODUCTORY ELEMENTS:

EXAMPLE: "AFTER THE SPEECH, JOHN GLENN WINKED."

4. TO SET OFF NON-ESSENTIAL INFORMATION:

EXAMPLE: "JOHN GLENN, THE ASTRONAUT, WINKED."

5. WITH DIRECT ADDRESS:

EXAMPLE: "JOHN, WINK AGAIN."

WHEN TO REMOVE COMMAS

REMOVE COMMAS WHEN THEY:

- INTERRUPT THE NATURAL FLOW OF A SENTENCE UNNECESSARILY
- SEPARATE ESSENTIAL INFORMATION FROM THE REST OF THE SENTENCE
- ARE USED WHERE A SEMICOLON OR PERIOD WOULD BE MORE APPROPRIATE

PRACTICAL EXAMPLES OF CORRECTING "JOHN GLENN WINKED,"

SCENARIO 1: STANDALONE SENTENCE

ORIGINAL: "JOHN GLENN WINKED,"

- CORRECTION: "JOHN GLENN WINKED."

THE COMMA IS REMOVED BECAUSE THE SENTENCE IS COMPLETE.

SCENARIO 2: PART OF A LIST OR SERIES

ORIGINAL: "HE WAVED, SMILED, JOHN GLENN WINKED,"

- CORRECTION: "HE WAVED, SMILED, AND JOHN GLENN WINKED."

ADDING A COORDINATING CONJUNCTION AND REMOVING THE COMMA AFTER THE LAST ITEM.

SCENARIO 3: ADDING EXTRA INFORMATION

ORIGINAL: "JOHN GLENN WINKED,"

- CORRECTION: "JOHN GLENN WINKED, A GESTURE THAT SURPRISED EVERYONE."

USING A COMMA TO SET OFF THE APPOSITIVE.

SCENARIO 4: USING INTRODUCTORY PHRASES

ORIGINAL: "AFTER THE MEETING, JOHN GLENN WINKED,"

- CORRECTION: "AFTER THE MEETING, JOHN GLENN WINKED."

NO CHANGE NEEDED; COMMAS CORRECTLY SET OFF INTRODUCTORY PHRASE.

COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW TO AVOID THEM

- **COMMA SPLICES:** CONNECTING TWO INDEPENDENT CLAUSES WITH JUST A COMMA—AVOID THIS BY USING A SEMICOLON, PERIOD, OR COORDINATING CONJUNCTION.

PUNCTUATION, ESPECIALLY COMMAS, IS A VITAL TOOL IN THE WRITER'S ARSENAL. IT GUIDES READERS THROUGH COMPLEX IDEAS, CLARIFIES MEANING, AND CONVEYS TONE AND RHYTHM. THE PROCESS OF ADDING OR REMOVING COMMAS—GUIDED BY GRAMMATICAL RULES AND CONTEXTUAL AWARENESS—IS ESSENTIAL TO PRODUCING CLEAR, PROFESSIONAL, AND ENGAGING WRITING.

IN OUR EXPLORATION OF THE PHRASE:

> "ADD OR REMOVE COMMAS, IF NECESSARY, UNTIL THE SENTENCE HAS CORRECT PUNCTUATION.> JOHN GLENN WINKED,"

WE SEE THAT CAREFUL EDITING TRANSFORMS A POTENTIALLY CONFUSING FRAGMENT INTO A COHERENT STATEMENT. REMOVING THE EXTRANEOUS ">" SYMBOL, CORRECTLY POSITIONING COMMAS IN THE INSTRUCTION, AND CLARIFYING THE FINAL STATEMENT HELP ACHIEVE PROPER PUNCTUATION.

KEY TAKEAWAYS:

FINAL THOUGHT: EMBRACE THE EDITING PROCESS

PUNCTUATION IS NOT A STATIC SET OF RULES BUT A DYNAMIC ASPECT OF LANGUAGE THAT REQUIRES THOUGHTFUL

APPLICATION. AS THE INSTRUCTIONAL PHRASE SUGGESTS, "ADD OR REMOVE COMMAS, IF NECESSARY," ALWAYS APPROACH PUNCTUATION WITH A CRITICAL EYE, STRIVING FOR CLARITY AND CORRECTNESS. WHETHER YOU'RE EDITING A SENTENCE ABOUT JOHN GLENN OR CONSTRUCTING COMPLEX ARGUMENTS, THE CAREFUL PLACEMENT OF COMMAS ELEVATES YOUR WRITING FROM GOOD TO GREAT.
