INCORRECT: THE DOGS' BONE IS BURIED.

CORRECT: THE DOGS' BONES ARE BURIED.

NOTE: WHEN REFERRING TO MULTIPLE DOGS POSSESSING SOMETHING, THE APOSTROPHE GOES AFTER THE "S" (DOGS'), AND THE NOUN SHOULD BE PLURAL IF REFERRING TO MULTIPLE BONES.

MISTAKE 4: USING APOSTROPHES FOR PLURAL DATES OR NUMBERS

INCORRECT: THE CLASS OF 1990'S IS GRADUATING.

CORRECT: THE CLASS OF 1990S IS GRADUATING.

EXPLANATION: APOSTROPHES ARE NOT USED TO PLURALIZE YEARS OR NUMBERS UNLESS INDICATING POSSESSION.

STEP-BY-STEP GUIDE TO CORRECTING APOSTROPHE ERRORS

NOTE: PAY ATTENTION TO CONTEXT—SINGULAR VS. PLURAL POSSESSION.

SPECIAL CASES AND ADVANCED TIPS
