RECOGNIZING AND RESPECTING SUCH DISSENT IS FUNDAMENTAL TO THE INTEGRITY OF THE JUDICIAL PROCESS, REINFORCING THAT JUSTICE IS SERVED NOT ONLY BY WHAT THE MAJORITY BELIEVES BUT ALSO BY THE STEADFAST PRINCIPLES OF INDIVIDUAL CONSCIENCE.

IN THE END, SUSAN'S DISSENT EXEMPLIFIES THE CORE DEMOCRATIC VALUE THAT JUSTICE MUST BE DELIBERATIVE, INCLUSIVE, AND REFLECTIVE OF DIVERSE PERSPECTIVES—AN ESSENTIAL FEATURE THAT SUSTAINS TRUST IN THE LEGAL SYSTEM AND UPHOLDS THE MORAL FABRIC OF SOCIETY.

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
