ONCE YOU'VE IDENTIFIED THE KEYWORDS AND PHRASES THAT INDICATE THE AUTHOR'S PURPOSE, YOU CAN BETTER UNDERSTAND THE TEXT AND EVEN GUIDE THE AUTHOR TO IMPROVE CLARITY AND EFFECTIVENESS. FOR EXAMPLE, IF AN AUTHOR'S PURPOSE IS TO INFORM BUT THEIR WRITING CONTAINS PERSUASIVE LANGUAGE, IT MIGHT BE HELPFUL TO SUGGEST THEY FOCUS ON OBJECTIVE FACTS AND NEUTRAL TONE. CONVERSELY, IF A PERSUASIVE PIECE LACKS COMPELLING EVIDENCE, POINTING OUT THE ABSENCE OF SUPPORTIVE KEYWORDS LIKE "EVIDENCE" OR "DATA" COULD BE BENEFICIAL.

FINAL TIPS

- ALWAYS CONSIDER THE CONTEXT: SOME KEYWORDS MAY SERVE DIFFERENT PURPOSES DEPENDING ON THEIR USE.
- PAY ATTENTION TO TONE ALONGSIDE KEYWORDS—TONE CAN REINFORCE OR WEAKEN THE PURPOSE INDICATED BY SPECIFIC PHRASES.
- PRACTICE ANALYZING VARIOUS TEXTS TO BECOME MORE FAMILIAR WITH THESE INDICATORS.

BY MASTERING THE RECOGNITION OF KEYWORDS AND PHRASES ASSOCIATED WITH EACH PURPOSE, YOU ENHANCE YOUR READING COMPREHENSION, ANALYTICAL SKILLS, AND ABILITY TO COMMUNICATE EFFECTIVELY ABOUT TEXTS.

REMEMBER, THE KEY TO UNDERSTANDING AN AUTHOR'S PURPOSE LIES IN CAREFULLY OBSERVING THEIR LANGUAGE CHOICES AND TONE. USE THESE INSIGHTS TO DEEPEN YOUR ENGAGEMENT WITH ANY WRITTEN MATERIAL.

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
