3. PROMOTION OF MULTIPLE-USE AND SUSTAINED-YIELD POLICIES

- THE FEDERAL LAND POLICY AND MANAGEMENT ACT OF 1976 CODIFIED THE CONCEPT OF "MULTIPLE USE," BUT THE FOUNDATIONS WERE LAID IN EARLIER POLICIES.
- CONGRESS ENCOURAGED BALANCING RESOURCE EXTRACTION WITH RECREATION AND CONSERVATION, REFLECTING A FLEXIBLE

APPROACH TO LAND MANAGEMENT.

- THIS POLICY AIMED TO ENSURE THAT LAND COULD SERVE VARIOUS ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL FUNCTIONS SIMULTANEOUSLY.

4. SUPPORT FOR PUBLIC RECREATION AND ACCESS

- RECOGNIZING THE INCREASING DEMAND FOR OUTDOOR RECREATION, CONGRESS ENACTED LAWS TO EXPAND ACCESS TO PUBLIC LANDS.
- THE FEDERAL-AID HIGHWAY ACT OF 1956 FACILITATED TRAVEL TO WESTERN RECREATIONAL SITES, BOOSTING TOURISM.
- LAND POLICIES PRIORITIZED CREATING NATIONAL PARKS, WILDERNESS AREAS, AND RECREATIONAL FACILITIES TO SERVE A GROWING POPULATION SEEKING OUTDOOR LEISURE ACTIVITIES.

5. CONFLICTS OVER GRAZING AND MINERAL RIGHTS

- CONGRESSIONAL POLICIES OFTEN GRAPPLED WITH BALANCING RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT AND CONSERVATION.
- LEGISLATION LIKE THE TAYLOR GRAZING ACT OF 1934, ALTHOUGH PRE-DATING THE POSTWAR PERIOD, CONTINUED TO INFLUENCE LAND USE BY REGULATING GRAZING ON PUBLIC LANDS.
- DURING THE POSTWAR ERA, DEBATES OVER MINERAL RIGHTS, GRAZING PERMITS, AND LOGGING RIGHTS HIGHLIGHTED ONGOING CONFLICTS BETWEEN ECONOMIC INTERESTS AND ENVIRONMENTAL CONSERVATION.

6. INITIATIVES FOR REGIONAL DEVELOPMENT AND URBANIZATION

- CONGRESS SUPPORTED INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS—SUCH AS DAMS, HIGHWAYS, AND IRRIGATION SYSTEMS—THAT TRANSFORMED THE WEST.
- THE BUREAU OF RECLAMATION PLAYED A SIGNIFICANT ROLE WITH PROJECTS LIKE THE HOOVER DAM (COMPLETED IN 1936) INFLUENCING POSTWAR LAND USE.
- THESE PROJECTS AIMED TO PROMOTE AGRICULTURE, URBAN GROWTH, AND HYDROELECTRIC POWER, OFTEN AT THE EXPENSE OF NATURAL LANDSCAPES.

7. THE ROLE OF LEGISLATION IN FACILITATING POSTWAR ECONOMIC GROWTH

- CONGRESSIONAL POLICIES AIMED TO LEVERAGE LAND RESOURCES FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, SUPPORTING INDUSTRIES LIKE MINING, LOGGING, AGRICULTURE, AND TOURISM.

- IT MANDATED ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT ASSESSMENTS FOR FEDERAL PROJECTS AFFECTING LAND USE, SHAPING FUTURE POLICIES.
