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WHEN CRAFTING A COMPELLING CONCLUSION, WRITERS OFTEN GRAPPLE WITH WHAT ELEMENTS ARE MOST APPROPRIATE TO INCLUDE. A CONCLUSION SERVES AS THE FINAL OPPORTUNITY TO REINFORCE YOUR MAIN POINTS, LEAVE A LASTING IMPRESSION, AND GUIDE YOUR READERS TOWARD FURTHER REFLECTION OR ACTION. AMONG THE COMMON COMPONENTS CONSIDERED—NEW EVIDENCE, SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS FOR READERS, AND REMINDERS—IT'S ESSENTIAL TO UNDERSTAND WHICH OF THESE DOES NOT BELONG IN A CONCLUSION TO MAINTAIN CLARITY, EFFECTIVENESS, AND COHERENCE. THIS ARTICLE EXPLORES EACH ELEMENT'S ROLE IN CONCLUSION WRITING, EMPHASIZES BEST PRACTICES, AND CLARIFIES WHICH ELEMENTS ARE APPROPRIATE AND WHICH ARE NOT, ALL OPTIMIZED FOR SEO TO SERVE WRITERS, EDUCATORS, STUDENTS, AND CONTENT CREATORS ALIKE.

UNDERSTANDING THE PURPOSE OF A CONCLUSION

BEFORE DIVING INTO SPECIFIC ELEMENTS, IT'S IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND THE FUNDAMENTAL PURPOSE OF A CONCLUSION IN ANY PIECE OF WRITING.

KEY OBJECTIVES OF A CONCLUSION

- SUMMARIZE MAIN POINTS: REINFORCE THE CORE IDEAS DISCUSSED IN THE BODY OF THE TEXT.
- PROVIDE CLOSURE: SIGNAL TO THE READER THAT THE DISCUSSION HAS REACHED ITS END.
- LEAVE A LASTING IMPRESSION: INSPIRE REFLECTION, MOTIVATION, OR FURTHER INTEREST.
- CALL TO ACTION (IF APPROPRIATE): ENCOURAGE READERS TO TAKE SPECIFIC STEPS OR THINK DIFFERENTLY.

KNOWING THESE OBJECTIVES SETS THE STAGE FOR EVALUATING WHETHER CERTAIN ELEMENTS ALIGN WITH THE CONCLUSION'S ROLE.

ELEMENTS COMMONLY CONSIDERED FOR INCLUSION IN A CONCLUSION

WHEN WRITING A CONCLUSION, WRITERS OFTEN CONSIDER INCLUDING:

- NEW EVIDENCE
- SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS FOR READERS
- A REMINDER

LET'S ANALYZE EACH ELEMENT'S APPROPRIATENESS IN THE CONCLUSION.

NEW EVIDENCE: DOES IT BELONG IN A CONCLUSION?

DEFINITION: NEW EVIDENCE REFERS TO ADDITIONAL FACTS, DATA, OR EXAMPLES THAT WERE NOT PREVIOUSLY INTRODUCED IN THE MAIN BODY OF THE WRITING.

ANALYSIS:

INCLUDING NEW EVIDENCE IN THE CONCLUSION IS GENERALLY DISCOURAGED. THE CONCLUSION'S PRIMARY ROLE IS TO SYNTHESIZE AND REINFORCE, NOT TO INTRODUCE NEW MATERIAL. PRESENTING NEW EVIDENCE AT THIS STAGE CAN CONFUSE READERS, AS IT SEEMS TO CONTRADICT THE PURPOSE OF WRAPPING UP THE DISCUSSION.

WHY NEW EVIDENCE DOES NOT BELONG IN A CONCLUSION:

- DISRUPTS COHERENCE: IT CAN MAKE THE CONCLUSION FEEL LIKE AN EXTENSION OF THE BODY RATHER THAN A SUMMARIZED ENDING.
- CONFUSES THE READER: INTRODUCING NEW INFORMATION AT THE END MAY LEAVE READERS WITH UNRESOLVED QUESTIONS.
- CONTRADICTS PURPOSE: INSTEAD OF CONSOLIDATING UNDERSTANDING, IT INTRODUCES POTENTIALLY UNANTICIPATED POINTS.

WHEN, IF EVER, IS IT APPROPRIATE?

RARELY, SOME WRITERS USE THE CONCLUSION TO INTRODUCE A FINAL, COMPELLING PIECE OF EVIDENCE TO PERSUADE OR EMPHASIZE A POINT. HOWEVER, THIS SHOULD BE DONE CAREFULLY AND SPARINGLY, IDEALLY IN THE FORM OF A BRIEF CLOSING REMARK RATHER THAN DETAILED NEW EVIDENCE.

BEST PRACTICE:

- USE EXISTING EVIDENCE ALREADY DISCUSSED.
- IF NEW EVIDENCE IS NECESSARY, INCORPORATE IT EARLIER IN THE BODY OR IN A DEDICATED SECTION, NOT IN THE CONCLUSION.

SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS FOR READERS: ARE THEY SUITABLE FOR A CONCLUSION?

DEFINITION: RECOMMENDATIONS OR SOLUTIONS ARE PRACTICAL STEPS OR IDEAS OFFERED TO ADDRESS A PROBLEM DISCUSSED IN THE TEXT.

ANALYSIS:

INCLUDING SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS IN THE CONCLUSION CAN BE APPROPRIATE, ESPECIALLY IN PERSUASIVE OR PROBLEM-SOLVING ESSAYS. THEY SERVE AS A NATURAL EXTENSION OF THE DISCUSSION, PROVIDING READERS WITH ACTIONABLE TAKEAWAYS.

WHEN TO INCLUDE SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS:

- IN PERSUASIVE OR PROPOSALS: WHEN ADVOCATING FOR CHANGE OR ACTION.
- IN PROBLEM-SOLVING CONTEXTS: TO GUIDE READERS TOWARD RESOLVING AN ISSUE.

HOW TO PRESENT THEM EFFECTIVELY:

- KEEP SUGGESTIONS CONCISE AND FOCUSED.
- ENSURE THEY ALIGN WITH THE MAIN POINTS DISCUSSED.
- FRAME THEM AS PART OF THE CONCLUDING REMARKS, NOT AS NEW IDEAS.

BEST PRACTICE:

- USE SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS TO REINFORCE THE MAIN MESSAGE.

- AVOID OVERWHELMING THE CONCLUSION WITH NUMEROUS RECOMMENDATIONS; INSTEAD, HIGHLIGHT THE MOST IMPACTFUL ONES.

A REMINDER: IS IT APPROPRIATE IN A CONCLUSION?

DEFINITION: A REMINDER IS A BRIEF PROMPT TO RECALL KEY INFORMATION OR PREVIOUS POINTS.

ANALYSIS:

REMINDERS ARE HIGHLY APPROPRIATE IN CONCLUSIONS. THEY HELP REINFORCE THE MAIN IDEAS, ENSURING THE READER LEAVES WITH THE CORE MESSAGES FRESH IN MIND.

WHY REMINDERS BELONG IN A CONCLUSION:

- REINFORCES KEY POINTS: SUMMARIZES WHAT HAS BEEN DISCUSSED.
- ENHANCES RETENTION: HELPS SOLIDIFY THE MAIN IDEAS.
- PROVIDES CLOSURE: TIES THE DISCUSSION TOGETHER NEATLY.

BEST PRACTICE:

- USE A REMINDER TO SUCCINCTLY RESTATE THESIS AND MAJOR POINTS.
- AVOID REPEATING VERBATIM; INSTEAD, PARAPHRASE FOR IMPACT.

SUMMARY: WHICH ELEMENT DOES NOT BELONG?

BASED ON THE ANALYSIS, HERE'S A CLEAR COMPARISON:

TIPS FOR WRITING EFFECTIVE CONCLUSIONS

- RESTATE YOUR THESIS AND MAIN POINTS CONCISELY.
- USE PARAPHRASING TO AVOID REDUNDANCY.
- INCORPORATE A CALL TO ACTION IF RELEVANT.
- AVOID INTRODUCING NEW EVIDENCE OR COMPLEX IDEAS.
- USE A COMPELLING CLOSING STATEMENT TO LEAVE A LASTING IMPRESSION.

SEO OPTIMIZATION FOR CONCLUSION WRITING ARTICLES

TO OPTIMIZE THIS CONTENT FOR SEO, IT'S IMPORTANT TO INCLUDE RELEVANT KEYWORDS NATURALLY WITHIN HEADERS AND BODY TEXT. FOCUS KEYWORDS SUCH AS:

REMEMBER: THE GOAL OF A CONCLUSION IS TO WRAP UP YOUR IDEAS, NOT TO INTRODUCE NEW COMPLEXITIES. KEEP IT FOCUSED, CONCISE, AND IMPACTFUL TO ENSURE YOUR READERS WALK AWAY WITH A CLEAR UNDERSTANDING AND A LASTING IMPRESSION.

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

BECAUSE A CONCLUSION IS MEANT TO SUMMARIZE AND WRAP UP THE DISCUSSION, NOT INTRODUCE NEW EVIDENCE WHICH SHOULD BE PRESENTED EARLIER IN THE MAIN BODY OF THE TEXT.

WHAT IS THE PRIMARY PURPOSE OF INCLUDING SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS IN A CONCLUSION?

THE PRIMARY PURPOSE IS TO PROVIDE READERS WITH ACTIONABLE STEPS OR IDEAS BASED ON THE INFORMATION DISCUSSED, LEAVING THEM WITH A SENSE OF DIRECTION OR PURPOSE.

IS A REMINDER APPROPRIATE IN A CONCLUSION, AND WHY?

YES, A REMINDER IS APPROPRIATE BECAUSE IT REINFORCES KEY POINTS OR IMPORTANT INFORMATION, HELPING READERS REMEMBER THE MAIN MESSAGE.

WHICH OF THE OPTIONS IS ESSENTIAL TO INCLUDE IN A CONCLUSION: NEW EVIDENCE, SUGGESTIONS, OR A REMINDER?

A REMINDER IS ESSENTIAL IN A CONCLUSION TO REINFORCE THE MAIN IDEAS, WHEREAS NEW EVIDENCE SHOULD BE AVOIDED AND SUGGESTIONS ARE OPTIONAL DEPENDING ON THE CONTEXT.

ADDITIONAL RESOURCES

WHICH OF THESE DOES NOT BELONG IN A CONCLUSION: NEW EVIDENCE, SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS FOR READERS, A REMINDER

WHEN CRAFTING A COMPELLING CONCLUSION, IT'S ESSENTIAL TO UNDERSTAND WHAT ELEMENTS SHOULD BE INCLUDED TO EFFECTIVELY WRAP UP YOUR MESSAGE, REINFORCE KEY POINTS, AND LEAVE YOUR AUDIENCE WITH A CLEAR UNDERSTANDING OR CALL TO ACTION. AMONG VARIOUS COMPONENTS THAT WRITERS OFTEN CONSIDER, SOME ARE APPROPRIATE FOR A CONCLUSION, WHILE OTHERS MAY DISRUPT THE FLOW OR DILUTE THE IMPACT. IN THIS DETAILED ANALYSIS, WE WILL EXPLORE THE QUESTION: WHICH OF THESE DOES NOT BELONG IN A CONCLUSION: NEW EVIDENCE, SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS FOR READERS, OR A REMINDER? WE WILL DELVE INTO EACH ELEMENT'S PURPOSE, APPROPRIATE PLACEMENT, AND POTENTIAL PITFALLS, PROVIDING CLARITY TO WRITERS STRIVING FOR IMPACTFUL CONCLUSIONS.

UNDERSTANDING THE PURPOSE OF A CONCLUSION

BEFORE EXAMINING THE SPECIFIC ELEMENTS, IT'S VITAL TO GRASP THE FUNDAMENTAL ROLE OF A CONCLUSION IN WRITING:

- SUMMARIZE MAIN POINTS: REINFORCE THE KEY IDEAS PRESENTED IN THE BODY OF THE WORK.
- PROVIDE CLOSURE: OFFER A SENSE OF COMPLETENESS AND RESOLUTION.
- LEAVE A LASTING IMPRESSION: ENGAGE THE READER EMOTIONALLY OR INTELLECTUALLY.
- CALL TO ACTION OR REFLECTION (IF APPROPRIATE): ENCOURAGE FURTHER THOUGHT OR DIRECT ACTION.

GIVEN THESE OBJECTIVES, CERTAIN ELEMENTS NATURALLY COMPLEMENT A CONCLUSION, WHILE OTHERS MAY BE MISPLACED OR EVEN COUNTERPRODUCTIVE.

ANALYZING THE ELEMENTS IN QUESTION

LET'S ANALYZE EACH OF THE THREE ELEMENTS: NEW EVIDENCE, SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS FOR READERS, AND A REMINDER, DETERMINING WHETHER THEY BELONG IN A CONCLUSION AND WHY.

NEW EVIDENCE

DEFINITION AND ROLE:

NEW EVIDENCE REFERS TO ADDITIONAL DATA, FACTS, OR EXAMPLES INTRODUCED TO SUPPORT CLAIMS, OFTEN FOUND IN THE BODY OF A PAPER. IT PROVIDES FRESH INSIGHTS OR REINFORCES ARGUMENTS BUT IS GENERALLY NOT PART OF THE CONCLUSION.

WHY IT USUALLY DOES NOT BELONG IN A CONCLUSION:

- CONTRADICTS THE PURPOSE OF A CONCLUSION: THE CONCLUSION SHOULD SYNTHESIZE EXISTING INFORMATION RATHER THAN INTRODUCE NEW DATA.
- DISRUPTS THE FLOW: PRESENTING NEW EVIDENCE CAN DISTRACT THE READER AND SHIFT FOCUS AWAY FROM THE SUMMARY AND FINAL THOUGHTS.
- LACKS CONTEXT: EVIDENCE INTRODUCED AT THE END WITHOUT PRIOR EXPLANATION CAN CONFUSE READERS, WHO RELY ON THE BODY FOR DETAILED SUPPORT.

EXCEPTIONS:

IN SOME CASES, A BRIEF MENTION OF ONGOING RESEARCH OR EMERGING EVIDENCE CAN BE APPROPRIATE IF IT UNDERSCORES THE IMPORTANCE OF THE TOPIC OR ENCOURAGES FURTHER EXPLORATION. HOWEVER, THIS IS MORE COMMON IN SCIENTIFIC OR TECHNICAL WRITING AND SHOULD BE HANDLED CAUTIOUSLY.

BEST PRACTICE:

- RESERVE NEW EVIDENCE FOR THE MAIN BODY OF YOUR WORK.
- USE THE CONCLUSION TO SYNTHESIZE AND INTERPRET EXISTING EVIDENCE, NOT TO INTRODUCE NEW DATA.

SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS FOR READERS

DEFINITION AND ROLE:

SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS INVOLVE PROPOSING WAYS TO ADDRESS ISSUES DISCUSSED IN THE PAPER. THEY CAN BE PRACTICAL RECOMMENDATIONS, POLICY PROPOSALS, OR CALLS FOR ACTION.

WHEN THEY BELONG:

- IN A CONCLUSION, THEY ARE USUALLY APPROPRIATE:
- ESPECIALLY IN PERSUASIVE OR PROBLEM-SOLUTION ESSAYS, OFFERING SOLUTIONS IS A NATURAL WAY TO END.
- THEY PROVIDE A SENSE OF PURPOSE AND DIRECTION FOR THE READER.
- REINFORCE THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE DISCUSSION.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS:

- ENSURE SUGGESTIONS ARE FEASIBLE AND DIRECTLY RELATED TO THE CONTENT.
- FRAME SOLUTIONS AS RECOMMENDATIONS RATHER THAN ABRUPT OR DISCONNECTED IDEAS.
- AVOID OVERLOADING THE CONCLUSION—BE CONCISE AND FOCUSED.

EXAMPLE:

IN SUMMARY:

- YES, SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS ARE APPROPRIATE IN A CONCLUSION WHEN THEY SERVE TO MOTIVATE ACTION OR PROVIDE CLOSURE.

A REMINDER

DEFINITION AND ROLE:

A REMINDER IS A BRIEF RESTATEMENT OF KEY POINTS, THEMES, OR MESSAGES TO REINFORCE THE MAIN IDEAS.

WHY IT BELONGS IN A CONCLUSION:

- REINFORCES MAIN IDEAS: HELPS ENSURE THE READER REMEMBERS CRITICAL INFORMATION.
- PROVIDES CLOSURE: SIGNALS THE END OF THE DISCUSSION AND CONSOLIDATES UNDERSTANDING.
- ENHANCES COMPREHENSION: ESPECIALLY USEFUL IN LONGER OR COMPLEX TEXTS.

EFFECTIVE USAGE:

- KEEP IT SUCCINCT, FOCUSING ON THE MOST VITAL POINTS.
- USE PARAPHRASING RATHER THAN EXACT REPETITION TO MAINTAIN ENGAGEMENT.

EXAMPLE:

“REMEMBER, SUSTAINABLE PRACTICES ARE ESSENTIAL FOR PRESERVING OUR ENVIRONMENT FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS.”

IN SUMMARY:

- REMINDERS ARE A VALUABLE COMPONENT OF A CONCLUSION, AS THEY REINFORCE THE CORE MESSAGE.

COMPARATIVE SUMMARY: WHICH DOES NOT BELONG?

BASED ON THE ABOVE ANALYSIS, WE CAN CLEARLY SEE THE ROLES AND APPROPRIATENESS OF EACH ELEMENT:

ELEMENT	BELONGS IN A CONCLUSION?	RATIONALE

THEREFORE, NEW EVIDENCE IS THE ELEMENT THAT DOES NOT BELONG IN A CONCLUSION AMONG THESE OPTIONS.

DEEP DIVE: WHY INTRODUCING NEW EVIDENCE IN CONCLUSIONS IS PROBLEMATIC

EXPANDING FURTHER ON WHY NEW EVIDENCE IS INAPPROPRIATE, IT'S IMPORTANT TO UNDERSTAND THE POTENTIAL PITFALLS:

- UNDERMINES THE LOGICAL STRUCTURE: CONCLUSIONS SHOULD REFLECT ON WHAT HAS ALREADY BEEN PRESENTED, NOT INTRODUCE NEW IDEAS THAT REQUIRE FURTHER EXPLANATION.
- DISORIENTS THE READER: THE READER EXPECTS A WRAP-UP, NOT A NEW PIECE OF INFORMATION THAT MIGHT NECESSITATE ADDITIONAL ANALYSIS OR CONTEXT.
- DIMINISHES THE IMPACT OF THE MAIN POINTS: INSTEAD OF REINFORCING WHAT HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED, NEW EVIDENCE CAN DILUTE THE STRENGTH OF EXISTING ARGUMENTS.

BEST PRACTICE:

ALWAYS RESERVE NEW EVIDENCE FOR THE BODY OF YOUR WORK; USE THE CONCLUSION TO INTERPRET, SYNTHESIZE, AND EMPHASIZE THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THAT EVIDENCE.

EFFECTIVE STRATEGIES FOR BUILDING A STRONG CONCLUSION

GIVEN THAT SUGGESTIONS, REMINDERS, AND OCCASIONALLY NEW EVIDENCE CAN INFLUENCE YOUR CONCLUSION, HERE ARE

STRATEGIES TO CRAFT IMPACTFUL ENDINGS:

- SUMMARIZE KEY POINTS SUCCINCTLY: RESTATE THE MAIN IDEAS WITHOUT COPYING VERBATIM.
- PROVIDE A CALL TO ACTION OR SOLUTIONS: OFFER PRACTICAL STEPS OR RECOMMENDATIONS IF SUITABLE.
- USE A COMPELLING CLOSING STATEMENT: END WITH A THOUGHT-PROVOKING QUESTION, QUOTE, OR STATEMENT TO LEAVE A LASTING IMPRESSION.
- AVOID INTRODUCING NEW EVIDENCE: STICK TO EXISTING INFORMATION TO MAINTAIN CLARITY AND FOCUS.

CONCLUSION: SUMMARIZING THE FINDINGS

TO ENCAPSULATE, WHEN CONSIDERING THE ELEMENTS OF A CONCLUSION, NEW EVIDENCE STANDS OUT AS THE ELEMENT THAT DOES NOT BELONG AMONG SUGGESTIONS, SOLUTIONS, OR REMINDERS. INCLUDING NEW EVIDENCE AT THE CONCLUSION CAN UNDERMINE THE PURPOSE OF WRAPPING UP AND LEAD TO CONFUSION OR WEAKENED IMPACT. CONVERSELY, SUGGESTIONS OR SOLUTIONS AND REMINDERS ARE BENEFICIAL AND OFTEN ESSENTIAL COMPONENTS OF A WELL-CRAFTED CONCLUSION, AS THEY REINFORCE THE MAIN MESSAGE AND MOTIVATE ACTION OR REFLECTION.

FINAL TAKEAWAY:

IN YOUR WRITING, BE STRATEGIC ABOUT WHAT YOU INCLUDE AT THE END. USE THE CONCLUSION TO SYNTHESIZE AND REINFORCE, NOT TO INTRODUCE NEW INFORMATION THAT BELONGS IN THE MAIN BODY. THIS APPROACH ENSURES YOUR CONCLUSION LEAVES A POWERFUL, COHERENT, AND MEMORABLE IMPRESSION ON YOUR READER.

REMEMBER: GOOD CONCLUSIONS DO NOT JUST END A PIECE—THEY ELEVATE IT, ENSURING THE READER WALKS AWAY FEELING SATISFIED, INFORMED, AND INSPIRED.
