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INTRODUCTION: THE LEGACY OF ANDREW JACKSON

HIS REMOVAL OF FEDERAL DEPOSITS FROM THE BANK AND SUBSEQUENT REDISTRIBUTION TO STATE-CHARTERED BANKS, KNOWN AS "PET BANKS," AIMED TO DECENTRALIZE FINANCIAL POWER AND PROMOTE ECONOMIC FAIRNESS.

DENOUNCING FEDERAL POLICIES THAT MARGINALIZED THE COMMON MAN

THE INDIAN REMOVAL ACT

ADVOCACY FOR THE DEMOCRATIC PARTY AND POLITICAL PARTICIPATION

EXPANDING VOTING RIGHTS

EXPANSION OF SUFFRAGE
