THIS LINE UNDERSCORES HIS VIEW OF HIS WIFE AS AN OBJECT—SOMETHING TO BE DISPLAYED AND CONTROLLED. HIS FIXATION ON HER "LIKING" OTHERS SUGGESTS THAT HIS JEALOUSY IS IRRATIONAL AND INTENSE, ULTIMATELY LEADING TO HER DEMISE.

PROS:

- EFFECTIVELY CAPTURES THE DESTRUCTIVE NATURE OF JEALOUSY.
- REVEALS THE DUKE'S OBSESSION WITH CONTROL AND REPUTATION.

CONS:

- THE DUKE'S PERSPECTIVE IS BIASED; WE ONLY SEE HIS SIDE, WHICH MIGHT DISTORT THE TRUTH.

POWER AND CONTROL

THE DUKE'S CONVERSATION WITH THE ENVOY REVEALS HIS DESIRE FOR DOMINANCE. HIS TONE IS AUTHORITATIVE AND CONDESCENDING, IMPLYING THAT HE BELIEVES HIS SOCIAL STATUS ENTITLES HIM TO CONTROL OTHERS:

- > "I GAVE COMMANDS;
- > THEN ALL SMILES STOPPED TOGETHER."

THIS CHILLING PHRASE SUGGESTS THAT THE DUKE'S EXERCISE OF POWER OVER HIS WIFE WAS LETHAL, HINTING AT POSSIBLE MURDER. BROWNING THUS PRESENTS THE THEME OF POWER AS CORRUPTING AND POTENTIALLY DEADLY.

FEATURES:

- USE OF MONOSYLLABIC, BLUNT LANGUAGE INTENSIFIES THE SENSE OF MENACE.
- THE CALM, CONTROLLED TONE CONTRASTS WITH THE VIOLENT IMPLICATIONS, HEIGHTENING THE SENSE OF SINISTER CONTROL.

PROS:

BROWNING SUBTLY CRITICIZES THE ARISTOCRACY'S MORAL DECADENCE BY PORTRAYING THE DUKE AS A PROUD, ARROGANT NOBLEMAN WHO SEES WOMEN AS POSSESSIONS. THE POEM'S SETTING AND TONE EVOKE THE OPULENCE OF THE RENAISSANCE COURT, BUT BENEATH THAT VENEER LIES CRUELTY:

- > "NOTICE NEPTUNE, THOUGH,
- > TAMING A SEA-HORSE, THOUGHT A RARITY,
- > WHICH CLAUS OF INNSBRUCK CAST IN BRONZE FOR ME!"

HERE, THE DUKE COMPARES HIMSELF TO A POWERFUL FIGURE WHO "TAMES" ART AND, METAPHORICALLY, WOMEN—HIGHLIGHTING HIS ARROGANCE AND SENSE OF ENTITLEMENT.

PROS:

- OFFERS A SATIRICAL CRITIQUE OF ARISTOCRATIC VALUES.
- USES ART AS A SYMBOL OF OBJECTIFICATION AND CONTROL.

CONS:

- COULD BE VIEWED AS OVERLY FOCUSED ON THE DUKE'S PERSONALITY WITHOUT BROADER SOCIAL CONTEXT.

EFFECTIVENESS OF BROWNING'S TECHNIQUE IN PRESENTING THE THEME

OVERALL, BROWNING'S USE OF DRAMATIC MONOLOGUE IS CENTRAL TO HOW HE PRESENTS AND EXPLORES THE MAIN THEMES, MAKING "MY LAST DUCHESS" A POWERFUL COMMENTARY ON THE DANGERS OF UNCHECKED POWER AND POSSESSIVENESS.

IN SUMMARY:

- BROWNING'S USE OF DRAMATIC MONOLOGUE IS A DELIBERATE AND EFFECTIVE TECHNIQUE THAT ALLOWS THE READER TO DELVE INTO THE DUKE'S PSYCHE.
- THE FORM EMPHASIZES KEY THEMES BY REVEALING CHARACTER TRAITS AND MORAL FLAWS THROUGH CONTROLLED, MANIPULATIVE SPEECH.
