- Plans for the near future: "I am meeting my friend tonight."

Forming the Present Continuous

The present continuous is formed with the present tense of the verb to be (am, is, are) + the base verb + -ing.

- I am working.
- You/We/They are working.
- He/She/It is working.

Common Time Expressions

Words and phrases frequently used with the present continuous include:

- Now
- At the moment
- Currently
- Today
- Right now

Guidelines for Choosing the Correct Tense

When to Use the Simple Present

1. Describe habitual actions or routines.
2. Express general truths or facts.
3. For scheduled future events.
4. In instructions or directions.

When to Use the Present Continuous

1. Describe actions happening at the moment of speaking.
2. Talk about temporary situations.
3. Describe ongoing changes or developments.
4. Express plans or arrangements for the near future.

Rules for Filling in the Blanks

Basic Rules for the Simple Present

- Use the base form of the verb for I, You, We, They.
- Add -s or -es for He, She, It.
- For verbs ending in -y preceded by a consonant, change -y to -ies (e.g., "study" → "studies").
- Use "do not" / "does not" for negative sentences.
- Use "do" / "does" for questions.

Basic Rules for the Present Continuous

- Use the correct form of "to be" (am, is, are) based on the subject.
- Add -ing to the base form of the main verb.
- For verbs ending in -e, drop the e and add -ing (e.g., "make" → "making").
- For one-syllable verbs ending in a consonant-vowel-consonant, double the final consonant before adding -ing (e.g., "run" → "running").
- Use "am not", "is not" / " isn't", "are not" / "aren't" for negatives.
- Form questions by inverting the subject and the auxiliary "to be".
