THE ROLE OF INFRASTRUCTURE AND TRANSPORTATION

RAILROADS: THE BACKBONE OF AMERICAN INDUSTRIALIZATION

THE GILDED AGE: A TIME OF PROSPERITY AND DISPARITY

ECONOMIC GROWTH AND MONOPOLIES

THE LAST DECADES OF THE 19TH CENTURY, KNOWN AS THE GILDED AGE, SAW UNPRECEDENTED ECONOMIC EXPANSION LED BY INDUSTRIAL TITANS LIKE CARNEGIE, ROCKEFELLER, AND VANDERBILT.
