THE DEBATE OVER THE MOST EFFECTIVE METHOD—WHETHER SURVEYS, EXPERIMENTS, OR OTHER APPROACHES—CONTINUES TO BE CENTRAL IN LAW ENFORCEMENT RESEARCH, ESPECIALLY WHEN EVALUATING THE IMPACT OF BODY-WORN CAMERAS (BWCs) ON POLICE USE OF FORCE. SELECTING THE APPROPRIATE RESEARCH DESIGN DEPENDS ON THE SPECIFIC QUESTIONS BEING ASKED, THE CONTEXT OF THE STUDY, AVAILABLE RESOURCES, AND ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS. THIS ARTICLE EXPLORES THE MOST SUITABLE RESEARCH METHODS FOR STUDYING BWCs AND POLICE USE OF FORCE, COMPARING THEIR ADVANTAGES AND LIMITATIONS TO GUIDE RESEARCHERS TOWARD THE MOST EFFECTIVE APPROACH.

UNDERSTANDING THE CONTEXT: WHY RESEARCH METHODOLOGY MATTERS

BEFORE DIVING INTO SPECIFIC METHODS, IT'S IMPORTANT TO RECOGNIZE WHY THE CHOICE OF RESEARCH DESIGN INFLUENCES THE QUALITY AND APPLICABILITY OF FINDINGS. DIFFERENT METHODS CAN SERVE THESE GOALS DIFFERENTLY.

- **CAUSAL INFERENCE:** DETERMINING WHETHER BWCs DIRECTLY LEAD TO REDUCTIONS IN USE OF FORCE REQUIRES ROBUST EXPERIMENTAL OR QUASI-EXPERIMENTAL DESIGNS.
- **PERCEPTION AND ATTITUDES:** SURVEYS ARE USEFUL FOR CAPTURING OPINIONS, BELIEFS, AND PERCEPTIONS OF OFFICERS, CIVILIANS, AND STAKEHOLDERS.
- **BEHAVIORAL ANALYSIS:** OBSERVATIONAL OR EXPERIMENTAL STUDIES CAN HELP ANALYZE ACTUAL BEHAVIOR UNDER CONTROLLED OR REAL-WORLD CONDITIONS.

GIVEN THESE FACTORS, SELECTING THE MOST APPROPRIATE METHOD HINGES ON ALIGNING RESEARCH GOALS WITH METHODOLOGICAL STRENGTHS.

SURVEY METHOD: GAINING INSIGHTS FROM PERSPECTIVES AND PERCEPTIONS

SURVEYS ARE ONE OF THE MOST COMMON METHODS USED IN SOCIAL SCIENCE RESEARCH, INCLUDING STUDIES ON POLICE USE OF FORCE AND BWCs.

ADVANTAGES OF SURVEYS

- **LARGE SAMPLE SIZES:** SURVEYS CAN REACH MANY PARTICIPANTS, PROVIDING BROAD PERSPECTIVES ACROSS DEPARTMENTS, REGIONS, OR DEMOGRAPHICS.
- **COST-EFFECTIVENESS:** COMPARED TO EXPERIMENTS, SURVEYS ARE OFTEN LESS RESOURCE-INTENSIVE.
- **QUANTITATIVE DATA:** THEY GENERATE MEASURABLE DATA ON ATTITUDES, PERCEPTIONS, AND REPORTED BEHAVIORS.
- **EASE OF ADMINISTRATION:** ONLINE OR PAPER SURVEYS CAN BE DISTRIBUTED WIDELY WITH RELATIVE EASE.

LIMITATIONS OF SURVEYS

- **SELF-REPORT BIAS:** PARTICIPANTS MIGHT PROVIDE SOCIALLY DESIRABLE OR INACCURATE RESPONSES.
- **LIMITED CAUSAL INFERENCE:** SURVEYS PRIMARILY REVEAL CORRELATIONS, NOT CAUSATION.
- **RESPONSE RATES:** ACHIEVING HIGH PARTICIPATION CAN BE CHALLENGING, POTENTIALLY SKEWING RESULTS.
- **CONTEXT DEPENDENCE:** RESPONSES MAY VARY BASED ON RESPONDENTS' UNDERSTANDING OR CURRENT EVENTS.

BEST USE CASES FOR SURVEYS IN BWC RESEARCH

- UNDERSTANDING OFFICERS' PERCEPTIONS OF BWCs AND THEIR IMPACT ON USE OF FORCE.
- GAUGING PUBLIC TRUST AND ATTITUDES POST-IMPLEMENTATION OF BWCs.
- COLLECTING DATA ON REPORTING BEHAVIORS AND COMPLIANCE.

EXPERIMENTAL METHODS: ESTABLISHING CAUSALITY WITH PRECISION

EXPERIMENTS, PARTICULARLY RANDOMIZED CONTROLLED TRIALS (RCTs), ARE CONSIDERED THE GOLD STANDARD FOR ESTABLISHING CAUSAL RELATIONSHIPS.

TYPES OF EXPERIMENTS IN BWC AND USE-OF-FORCE RESEARCH

- **FIELD EXPERIMENTS:** IMPLEMENTING BWCs IN CERTAIN PRECINCTS OR WITH RANDOMLY SELECTED OFFICERS TO OBSERVE REAL-WORLD EFFECTS.
- **LABORATORY EXPERIMENTS:** SIMULATING POLICE-CIVILIAN INTERACTIONS IN CONTROLLED SETTINGS TO EXAMINE RESPONSES TO BWCs.
- **QUASI-EXPERIMENTS:** USING NATURAL VARIATIONS, SUCH AS POLICY CHANGES OR ROLLOUT SCHEDULES, TO COMPARE OUTCOMES ACROSS GROUPS.

ADVANTAGES OF EXPERIMENTAL METHODS

- **HIGH INTERNAL VALIDITY:** RANDOMIZATION MINIMIZES CONFOUNDING VARIABLES, ALLOWING CLEARER ATTRIBUTION OF EFFECTS.
- **CLEAR CAUSAL INFERENCE:** WELL-DESIGNED EXPERIMENTS CAN DEMONSTRATE WHETHER BWCs DIRECTLY INFLUENCE USE-OF-FORCE OUTCOMES.
- **CONTROLLED CONDITIONS:** RESEARCHERS CAN MANIPULATE VARIABLES TO ISOLATE SPECIFIC FACTORS.

LIMITATIONS OF EXPERIMENTAL METHODS

- **ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS:** RANDOMLY ASSIGNING OFFICERS OR DEPARTMENTS TO USE OR NOT USE BWCs RAISES ETHICAL QUESTIONS.
- **PRACTICAL CHALLENGES:** IMPLEMENTING EXPERIMENTS IN REAL-WORLD POLICE SETTINGS CAN BE LOGISTICALLY COMPLEX AND COSTLY.
- **GENERALIZABILITY:** FINDINGS FROM CONTROLLED SETTINGS MAY NOT TRANSLATE SEAMLESSLY TO BROADER CONTEXTS.
- **HAWTHORNE EFFECT:** PARTICIPANTS MAY ALTER THEIR BEHAVIOR BECAUSE THEY KNOW THEY ARE BEING STUDIED.

BEST USE CASES FOR EXPERIMENTS IN BWC RESEARCH

- TESTING SPECIFIC POLICY INTERVENTIONS RELATED TO BWC DEPLOYMENT.
- MEASURING BEHAVIORAL CHANGES UNDER CONTROLLED CONDITIONS.
- EVALUATING THE IMMEDIATE IMPACT OF BWCs ON OFFICER DECISION-MAKING.

OTHER METHODOLOGIES TO CONSIDER

WHILE SURVEYS AND EXPERIMENTS ARE PRIMARY, OTHER RESEARCH APPROACHES ALSO CONTRIBUTE VALUABLE INSIGHTS.

QUALITATIVE RESEARCH

- CONDUCTING INTERVIEWS, FOCUS GROUPS, AND CASE STUDIES PROVIDES IN-DEPTH UNDERSTANDING OF PERCEPTIONS, EXPERIENCES, AND CONTEXTUAL FACTORS.
- USEFUL FOR EXPLORING COMPLEX ISSUES THAT QUANTITATIVE METHODS MIGHT OVERLOOK.

OBSERVATIONAL STUDIES

- WATCHING AND RECORDING ACTUAL POLICE INTERACTIONS CAN SHED LIGHT ON BEHAVIOR PATTERNS AND BWC USAGE IN REAL TIME.
- LESS INTRUSIVE THAN EXPERIMENTS BUT LIMITED BY OBSERVER EFFECTS AND RESOURCE REQUIREMENTS.

CHOOSING THE BEST METHOD: FACTORS TO CONSIDER

WHEN SELECTING A RESEARCH APPROACH, CONSIDER THE FOLLOWING:

- **RESEARCH QUESTION:** CAUSALITY CALLS FOR EXPERIMENTS; PERCEPTIONS AND ATTITUDES SUIT SURVEYS.
- **ETHICAL CONSTRAINTS:** RANDOMIZATION MAY NOT BE FEASIBLE OR ETHICAL IN CERTAIN CONTEXTS.
- **RESOURCES AND TIME:** EXPERIMENTS OFTEN REQUIRE MORE FUNDING AND LOGISTICAL PLANNING.
- **REALISM VS. CONTROL:** FIELD STUDIES OFFER REAL-WORLD RELEVANCE; LABORATORY SETUPS ALLOW CONTROL OVER VARIABLES.
- **DATA NEEDS:** QUANTITATIVE FOR MEASURING OUTCOMES; QUALITATIVE FOR UNDERSTANDING EXPERIENCES.

COMBINING METHODS FOR A COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH

MANY RESEARCHERS ADVOCATE FOR MIXED-METHODS STRATEGIES TO CAPITALIZE ON THE STRENGTHS OF DIFFERENT APPROACHES.

ADVANTAGES OF MIXED METHODS

- **HOLISTIC INSIGHTS:** COMBINING QUANTITATIVE AND QUALITATIVE DATA PROVIDES A RICHER UNDERSTANDING.
- **VALIDATION:** CROSS-VALIDATING FINDINGS ENHANCES CREDIBILITY.
- **FLEXIBILITY:** ADDRESSING MULTIPLE FACETS OF COMPLEX ISSUES LIKE BWC IMPACT.

EXAMPLE OF AN INTEGRATED APPROACH

- CONDUCT A SURVEY TO MEASURE OFFICERS' PERCEPTIONS.
- FOLLOW UP WITH A FIELD EXPERIMENT TO OBSERVE ACTUAL USE OF FORCE.
- USE QUALITATIVE INTERVIEWS TO CONTEXTUALIZE QUANTITATIVE FINDINGS.

CONCLUSION: THE OPTIMAL PATH FOR BWC AND USE-OF-FORCE RESEARCH

ULTIMATELY, THE BEST RESEARCH METHOD DEPENDS ON THE SPECIFIC OBJECTIVES, ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS, AND AVAILABLE RESOURCES. FOR ESTABLISHING CAUSALITY BETWEEN BWCs AND POLICE USE OF FORCE, EXPERIMENTS—PARTICULARLY FIELD RCTs—ARE INVALUABLE, DESPITE THEIR CHALLENGES. SURVEYS EXCEL AT CAPTURING PERCEPTIONS, ATTITUDES, AND SELF-REPORTED BEHAVIORS, PROVIDING ESSENTIAL CONTEXT. COMBINING THESE METHODS WITH QUALITATIVE INSIGHTS CAN LEAD TO A COMPREHENSIVE UNDERSTANDING OF HOW BWCs INFLUENCE POLICING OUTCOMES.

IN SUM, THERE IS NO ONE-SIZE-FITS-ALL ANSWER. INSTEAD, AN INTEGRATED APPROACH LEVERAGING THE STRENGTHS OF MULTIPLE METHODOLOGIES OFTEN YIELDS THE MOST RELIABLE AND ACTIONABLE INSIGHTS. POLICYMAKERS, LAW ENFORCEMENT AGENCIES, AND RESEARCHERS MUST CAREFULLY CONSIDER THEIR GOALS AND CONSTRAINTS TO SELECT THE MOST APPROPRIATE METHOD OR COMBINATION OF METHODS FOR STUDYING THE IMPACT OF BODY-WORN CAMERAS ON POLICE USE OF FORCE.

WHAT RESEARCH METHOD IS MOST EFFECTIVE FOR UNDERSTANDING POLICE USE OF FORCE WITH BODY-WORN CAMERAS?

YES, CONTROLLED EXPERIMENTS, SUCH AS ROLE-PLAYING SCENARIOS OR VIRTUAL SIMULATIONS, CAN MIMIC REAL-WORLD SITUATIONS TO ASSESS POLICE RESPONSES, BUT THEY MAY LACK SOME ECOLOGICAL VALIDITY.

THIS ARTICLE EXPLORES THESE METHODOLOGIES, WEIGHING THEIR ADVANTAGES AND DISADVANTAGES, TO HELP RESEARCHERS DETERMINE THE MOST SUITABLE APPROACH FOR STUDYING BWCs AND POLICE USE OF FORCE.

UNDERSTANDING THE CONTEXT OF RESEARCH ON BODY-WORN CAMERAS AND POLICE USE OF FORCE

THE INTEGRATION OF BWCs IN LAW ENFORCEMENT HAS GARNERED SIGNIFICANT ATTENTION DUE TO POTENTIAL BENEFITS SUCH AS INCREASED TRANSPARENCY, ACCOUNTABILITY, AND COMMUNITY TRUST. HOWEVER, ASSESSING THEIR EFFECTIVENESS

ACHIEVING CREDIBLE ANSWERS INVOLVES CHOOSING THE RIGHT RESEARCH DESIGN. THE IDEAL METHOD SHOULD CONTROL FOR CONFOUNDING VARIABLES, ALLOW FOR CAUSAL INFERENCE WHERE POSSIBLE, AND ENSURE ETHICAL STANDARDS ARE MAINTAINED.

METHODOLOGIES IN RESEARCH ON BWCs AND USE OF FORCE

BELOW, WE ANALYZE THE MOST COMMON RESEARCH METHODS SUITED FOR THIS DOMAIN, HIGHLIGHTING THEIR FEATURES, STRENGTHS, AND LIMITATIONS.

SURVEYS

SURVEYS ARE A WIDELY USED METHOD FOR COLLECTING DATA FROM LARGE SAMPLES, INCLUDING POLICE OFFICERS, COMMUNITY MEMBERS, OR BOTH. THEY CAN PROVIDE INSIGHTS INTO PERCEPTIONS, ATTITUDES, AND SELF-REPORTED BEHAVIORS RELATED TO BWCs AND USE OF FORCE.

FEATURES:

- CAN REACH A BROAD AUDIENCE QUICKLY.
- USEFUL FOR COLLECTING SUBJECTIVE DATA SUCH AS PERCEPTIONS AND ATTITUDES.
- COST-EFFECTIVE AND RELATIVELY EASY TO ADMINISTER.

PROS:

- LARGE SAMPLE SIZES INCREASE GENERALIZABILITY.
- QUANTITATIVE DATA ALLOW FOR STATISTICAL ANALYSIS.
- CAN IDENTIFY CORRELATIONS BETWEEN VARIABLES LIKE OFFICER ATTITUDES AND USE OF FORCE INCIDENTS.

CONS:

- SELF-REPORT BIAS: RESPONDENTS MAY UNDERREPORT UNDESIRABLE BEHAVIORS OR OVERSTATE POSITIVE PERCEPTIONS.
- LIMITED IN ESTABLISHING CAUSALITY.
- RESPONSE RATES CAN VARY, POTENTIALLY LEADING TO NON-RESPONSE BIAS.

BEST USE CASES:

- GAUGING COMMUNITY TRUST POST-BWC DEPLOYMENT.
- UNDERSTANDING OFFICERS' PERCEPTIONS OF BWCs' IMPACT ON THEIR BEHAVIOR.

EXPERIMENTS (RANDOMIZED CONTROLLED TRIALS – RCTs)

EXPERIMENTS, ESPECIALLY RCTs, ARE CONSIDERED THE GOLD STANDARD FOR ESTABLISHING CAUSALITY. IN THE CONTEXT OF BWCs, THIS INVOLVES RANDOMLY ASSIGNING OFFICERS OR PRECINCTS TO EITHER WEAR BWCs OR NOT, THEN MEASURING DIFFERENCES IN USE OF FORCE INCIDENTS.

FEATURES:

- HIGH INTERNAL VALIDITY.
- CONTROL OVER EXTRANEOUS VARIABLES THROUGH RANDOMIZATION.

- CAN BE CONDUCTED AS FIELD EXPERIMENTS OR LABORATORY SIMULATIONS.

PROS:

- STRONG EVIDENCE FOR CAUSAL EFFECTS OF BWCs ON USE OF FORCE.
- ABILITY TO CONTROL FOR CONFOUNDING VARIABLES.
- CAN ASSESS THE IMPACT OF BWCs UNDER VARIED CONDITIONS.

CONS:

- ETHICAL CONCERNS: WITHHOLDING POTENTIALLY BENEFICIAL TECHNOLOGY FROM CONTROL GROUPS.
- LOGISTICALLY COMPLEX AND EXPENSIVE.
- MAY FACE RESISTANCE FROM POLICE DEPARTMENTS OR OFFICERS.
- EXTERNAL VALIDITY MAY BE LIMITED IF THE EXPERIMENTAL SETTING DOES NOT REFLECT REAL-WORLD CONDITIONS.

BEST USE CASES:

- TESTING WHETHER BWCs DIRECTLY CAUSE REDUCTIONS IN USE OF FORCE.
- EVALUATING SPECIFIC POLICY INTERVENTIONS OR TRAINING PROGRAMS ASSOCIATED WITH BWC USE.

CASE STUDIES AND QUALITATIVE RESEARCH

CASE STUDIES INVOLVE IN-DEPTH ANALYSIS OF SPECIFIC POLICE DEPARTMENTS OR COMMUNITIES BEFORE AND AFTER BWC IMPLEMENTATION. QUALITATIVE METHODS LIKE INTERVIEWS AND FOCUS GROUPS ADD RICH CONTEXTUAL UNDERSTANDING.

FEATURES:

- DEEP EXPLORATION OF SPECIFIC CONTEXTS.
- USEFUL FOR UNDERSTANDING PERCEPTIONS, EXPERIENCES, AND ORGANIZATIONAL CULTURE.

PROS:

- PROVIDES NUANCED INSIGHTS INTO HOW BWCs INFLUENCE POLICE BEHAVIOR AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS.
- CAN IDENTIFY UNINTENDED CONSEQUENCES OR BARRIERS TO EFFECTIVENESS.
- USEFUL FOR GENERATING HYPOTHESES FOR LARGER STUDIES.

CONS:

- LIMITED GENERALIZABILITY.
- TIME-CONSUMING AND RESOURCE-INTENSIVE.
- POTENTIAL RESEARCHER BIAS IN INTERPRETATION.

BEST USE CASES:

- EXPLORING IMPLEMENTATION CHALLENGES.
- UNDERSTANDING COMMUNITY AND OFFICER PERCEPTIONS IN SPECIFIC SETTINGS.

OBSERVATIONAL AND FIELD STUDIES

OBSERVATIONAL STUDIES INVOLVE RESEARCHERS DIRECTLY OBSERVING POLICE INTERACTIONS, EITHER COVERTLY OR OVERTLY, TO RECORD USE OF FORCE INCIDENTS WITH OR WITHOUT BWC ACTIVATION.

FEATURES:

- DATA COLLECTED IN REAL-WORLD SETTINGS.
- CAN INCLUDE VIDEO ANALYSIS OF RECORDED BWC FOOTAGE.

PROS:

- HIGH ECOLOGICAL VALIDITY.

- CAN PROVIDE DETAILED CONTEXTUAL DATA.
- ENABLES COMPARISON OF BEHAVIOR WITH AND WITHOUT BWC ACTIVATION.

CONS:

- ETHICAL ISSUES RELATED TO PRIVACY AND CONSENT.
- POTENTIAL OBSERVER EFFECT: OFFICERS MAY ALTER BEHAVIOR IF AWARE OF BEING WATCHED.
- RESOURCE-INTENSIVE.

BEST USE CASES:

- ANALYZING ACTUAL POLICE BEHAVIOR DURING USE OF FORCE INCIDENTS.
- VALIDATING SELF-REPORTED DATA FROM SURVEYS OR INTERVIEWS.

MIXED METHODS

COMBINING QUANTITATIVE AND QUALITATIVE APPROACHES CAN OFFER COMPREHENSIVE INSIGHTS. FOR EXAMPLE, A STUDY MIGHT INVOLVE A SURVEY TO QUANTIFY PERCEPTIONS AND INTERVIEWS TO UNDERSTAND UNDERLYING REASONS.

FEATURES:

- TRIANGULATION OF DATA ENHANCES VALIDITY.
- PROVIDES BOTH BREADTH AND DEPTH.

PROS:

- ADDRESSES MULTIPLE ASPECTS OF COMPLEX ISSUES.
- COMPENSATES FOR LIMITATIONS OF SINGLE METHODS.

CONS:

- MORE COMPLEX TO DESIGN AND ANALYZE.
- REQUIRES EXPERTISE IN MULTIPLE METHODOLOGIES.

BEST USE CASES:

- HOLISTIC EVALUATIONS OF BWC POLICIES.
- UNDERSTANDING BOTH STATISTICAL TRENDS AND CONTEXTUAL NUANCES.

CHOOSING THE BEST METHOD FOR RESEARCH ON BWCs AND USE OF FORCE

THERE IS NO ONE-SIZE-FITS-ALL ANSWER; THE BEST METHODOLOGY DEPENDS ON THE SPECIFIC RESEARCH QUESTIONS, AVAILABLE RESOURCES, ETHICAL CONSIDERATIONS, AND THE CONTEXT OF THE STUDY.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS INCLUDE:

- CAUSALITY: IF THE PRIMARY GOAL IS TO ESTABLISH WHETHER BWCs CAUSE REDUCTIONS IN USE OF FORCE, EXPERIMENTAL OR QUASI-EXPERIMENTAL DESIGNS ARE PREFERRED.
- DEPTH OF UNDERSTANDING: TO EXPLORE PERCEPTIONS, ORGANIZATIONAL CULTURE, OR IMPLEMENTATION CHALLENGES, QUALITATIVE OR CASE STUDY METHODS ARE MORE SUITABLE.
- SCALE: LARGE-SCALE SURVEYS CAN PROVIDE BROAD GENERALIZATIONS, WHILE FIELD EXPERIMENTS OR OBSERVATIONAL STUDIES TEND TO BE MORE RESOURCE-INTENSIVE.
- ETHICAL CONSTRAINTS: RANDOMIZED EXPERIMENTS MAY FACE ETHICAL ISSUES IF WITHHOLDING BWCs IS SEEN AS POTENTIALLY HARMFUL.

PRACTICAL RECOMMENDATIONS:

- FOR RIGOROUS CAUSAL INFERENCE, FIELD EXPERIMENTS OR QUASI-EXPERIMENTAL DESIGNS (LIKE DIFFERENCE-IN-DIFFERENCES) ARE IDEAL, PROVIDED ETHICAL AND LOGISTICAL CHALLENGES ARE ADDRESSED.
- FOR UNDERSTANDING PERCEPTIONS, ATTITUDES, AND COMMUNITY IMPACT, SURVEYS COMBINED WITH QUALITATIVE INTERVIEWS OFFER A RICH, COMPREHENSIVE APPROACH.
- FOR DETAILED BEHAVIORAL ANALYSIS, OBSERVATIONAL STUDIES AND ANALYSIS OF BWC FOOTAGE ARE INVALUABLE.
- COMBINING METHODS INTO A MIXED-METHODS APPROACH OFTEN YIELDS THE MOST NUANCED AND ACTIONABLE INSIGHTS.

CONCLUSION

RESEARCHING THE IMPACT OF BODY-WORN CAMERAS ON POLICE USE OF FORCE INVOLVES NAVIGATING COMPLEX METHODOLOGICAL CHOICES. WHILE EXPERIMENTS PROVIDE STRONG CAUSAL EVIDENCE, THEY ARE OFTEN CHALLENGING TO IMPLEMENT IN REAL-WORLD POLICING ENVIRONMENTS. SURVEYS AND QUALITATIVE STUDIES ARE INVALUABLE FOR CAPTURING PERCEPTIONS AND CONTEXTUAL FACTORS BUT MAY LACK CAUSAL CLARITY. OBSERVATIONAL AND FIELD STUDIES OFFER REAL-WORLD BEHAVIORAL DATA BUT COME WITH ETHICAL AND LOGISTICAL HURDLES. ULTIMATELY, THE MOST EFFECTIVE RESEARCH STRATEGY OFTEN INVOLVES A COMBINATION OF METHODS—EMBRACING A MIXED-METHODS APPROACH—TO LEVERAGE THE STRENGTHS OF EACH AND MITIGATE THEIR WEAKNESSES.

BY CAREFULLY SELECTING AND TAILORING RESEARCH METHODS, SCHOLARS AND POLICYMAKERS CAN GENERATE ROBUST EVIDENCE TO INFORM THE DEPLOYMENT OF BWCS AND STRATEGIES TO ENHANCE POLICING PRACTICES AND COMMUNITY RELATIONS. AS THE FIELD CONTINUES TO EVOLVE, EMBRACING METHODOLOGICAL RIGOR AND ETHICAL INTEGRITY REMAINS PARAMOUNT IN UNCOVERING THE TRUE IMPACT OF BODY-WORN CAMERAS ON POLICE USE OF FORCE.
